Zero, Zip, Nada No Jobs In August

The employment figures have been released for August and they are grim. No new jobs in August and the unemployment rate remained at 9.1 percent. 14 million workers remain unemployed, but a total of 26 Million American are unemployed, underemployed or have stopped looking for work. Employment increased primarily in two areas: health care by 30,000 and mining by 6,000. Employment in the information industry declined by 48,000 in August, with 45,000 workers at Verizon on strike. Manufacturing lost 3,000 jobs and employment in construction, trade, transportation and other areas changed little over the month. Job loss in the public sector totaled 17,000 in August. Since employment peaked in September 2008, local government has lost 550,000 jobs.

The economy is poised to fall into deep depression.

THE EMPLOYMENT SITUATION – AUGUST 2011

Nonfarm payroll employment was unchanged (0) in August, and the unemployment rate held at 9.1 percent, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported today. Employment in most major industries changed little over the month. Health care continued to add jobs, and a decline in information employment reflected a strike. Government employment continued to trend down, despite the return of workers from a partial government shutdown in Minnesota.

Mr. President, You Are Giving Away Your Presidency


What can the government do to create demand? Put people to work so they have money to spend. A competent economic advisor would have a more creative approach than a tax credit.

GADC Meeting, August 11, 2011

The appraisal value of Garland homes has dropped 10% from pre-recession values lowering property tax receipts. City revenue

from sales tax, ambulance fees, building permits and court fines are also down. The City Council was able to balance the budget without raising the property tax rate because employee salaries will remain level as they have for four years, debt was refinanced at a lower rate, and the time to payoff the outstanding city bond issue was extended three years. No employees will be laid off, but positions which become vacant will not be filled. Mr. Williams said he had favored considering an increase in the city tax rate because the council may have to make “ugly cuts” next year if revenues do not increase. Williams explained the Garland tax rate of \$0.7046 per \$100 of assessed valuation is higher than the rates of some other suburbs because the tax rate is an inverse function of wealth. Cities with higher appraisal values can raise more money with a lower tax rate than Garland can. For example, Richardson with similar per capita expenses has a tax rate of \$0.055. Highland Park is \$0.022.

Council member Williams said the reason electricity rates of municipal utilities like GP&L who opted to stay out of the Texas Utility Group are now the highest rates in Texas when they used to be some of the lowest is because coal became more expensive and the price of natural gas dropped. The municipal utilities have a long term commitment to buy electricity from coal fired plants and the Utility Groups power is produced almost entirely from burning gas. “The 85% of Garland residents who are getting relatively expensive electricity from GP&L can take comfort in the knowledge their service is more reliable”

suggested Williams. “Last winter when the grid had to shut down, the longest GP&L customers were without power was 4 hours. Utility Group customers were without power for as much as 3 days.”



Liz Wally, President Texas Clean Elections


If you want to run for office or you want your vote to count more than a corporation's bank roll, you want public



financing of elections is the message Liz Wally, President of Texas Clean Elections organization, brought to our GADC August meeting. Many candidates, including incumbents, don't enjoy spending over a third of their time raising money to win the next election. In Arizona and Maine, which have public funding for state elections and the various local governments which have public funding, 70 to 90% of the candidates choose to use public funding. It changes the dialogue of campaigns by increasing communication with constituents, and making almost all races contested races thus

giving voters more information and more choices.

The Citizen's United Supreme Court decision gave money the freedom of speech in political advertisements. The constitutionality of



public funding has been upheld. Liz Wally reported Clean Elections is ramping up work to publicize public financing of elections and prepare model legislation to introduce in the Legislature.

Many of the existing public funding laws were propelled into place by political scandals. The feeling in Clean Elections is, “Things are moving fast and we want to be ready.” For information on public election

Tar Sands Destruction Home on the Range in Texas

The proposed Trans-Canada Company's pipeline to pump Canadian crude-oil tar-sand sludge from Alberta, Canada to Port Arthur, Texas is being protested across the nation, with the focus on the White House, where daily sit-ins will occur through September 6th. This proposed pipeline is fiercely protested by many East Texas landowners, many of whom are heading to D.C. to participate in the ongoing White House sit-in/protest. A caravan representing East Texas folks departed Tyler, Texas on Saturday, August 20th to join the protest. Many more will be following soon.

Like Rick Perry's infamous Trans-Texas Corridor proposal years back, building this pipeline is a usurpation of the landowners rights by corporate planners. The planners leave the future toxic mess on the backs of Texas taxpayers. Like the Trans-Texas Corridor proposal, construction of this KeystoneXL pipeline must be resisted by all Texans.

Supposedly, the pipeline will create 20,000 jobs, reduce the dependence on Mid-East oil and help keep gas prices down. But I ask, "What does it gain to have 20,000 short-term jobs yet risk the permanent destruction of a significant part of East Texas? Especially when there will not be 20,000 jobs and America's dependence on Mid-East oil will not be diminished."

This crude-oil tar-sand sludge is currently pumped from Canada to the U.S. and refined in the Midwest. Expanding the pipeline's capacity, only to move all of it farther south to refineries on the Texas Coast increases gas prices in the Midwest and does not bring down gas prices for the rest of us. However, increasing the markets to which refined products can be sold will increase corporate profits -- at the expense of Texas' landowners. Long and short, America will not have a reliable source of "friendly" oil at a "friendly" price. The American consumer, East Texas landowners and Texans all will receive the short end of the stick.

The product in this pipeline is not your regular crude oil. It is pressurized, hot, corrosive chemical slurry. To handle leaks properly will require top notch, highly trained, first responders. With 34,000 pipeline leaks each year in the U.S., there is a serious need to consider leaks likely and have a plan to handle them. The Trans-Canada Pipeline Company has a history of poor management and follow-up to correct the problems.

When the Trans-Canada Company's KeystoneXL Pipeline is built, the company admits there will be pipeline breaks & leaks. This Company has no emergency plan in place or in theory to deal with the spills and the corrosive destruction of the poisonous sludge. The existing pipeline relies on the local fire and police departments to be the first responders. A responsible company, knowing full well the expected failure rate, will have knowledgeable people nearby and an emergency crew in place to handle things. An irresponsible company has an 1-800 number to a Houston office with advice to keep people away from the spill. The 1-800 number is The Trans-Canada Company protocol (plan) to handle emergencies.

What advice will be given to the volunteer fire departments in Rusk or Jacksonville; or counties like Wood or Polk; and the other communities in East Texas? Trans-Canada's advice will be to call the 1-800 number, then standby and watch their friends' and neighbors' lands, water and livelihoods sink into a boiling, chemical soup straight from hell itself.

Tar Sands Destruction



Damage Unlikely...

The third State Department environmental analysis in a year says it is “unlikely” there will be environmental damage from a tar sands pipeline from Canada to Houston. This environmental impact report may be a pretty good risk analysis, and our government is a pretty good government; but there is some history of our government being neither honest nor correct.

The U.S. did a 40 year study of syphilis in Tuskegee, Alabama. The participants were not told they had syphilis nor were they treated for it. Between 1945 and 1958 military personnel were used in the Nevada desert and at Bikini Atoll in the Pacific to test the effect of nuclear bombs on humans. According to a 1996 article in the *Gonzaga Law Review* by Leonard W. Schroeder, *Human Experimentation, The Hanford Site, and Judgment at Nuremberg*, there were pamphlets at what is now called the Nevada Test Site, which said, “there was no threat of danger” from the nuclear tests. The 2nd Iraq War has been going on for 8 years due to Saddam Hussein’s weapons of mass destruction. The existence of WMDs was either an intelligence mistake or an excuse for war.

Even if the State Department’s analysis of unlikely tar sands pipeline damage is completely thorough and correct, shouldn’t consideration be given to how much damage could be done if the unlikely happened? If a little foot bridge in a park collapses it is not going to do lot damage. When the I-35 Bridge over the Mississippi River in Minneapolis collapsed dozens of cars plunged into the river and 13 people died.

The tar sands pipeline will be 30 to 36 inches in diameter buried 4 ft deep and will carry the liquefied “tar” from Canada to Houston. The pipeline will cross the Ogallala Aquifer which supplies water to Nebraska, Kansas, and the panhandles of Oklahoma and Texas and also crosses hundreds of watersheds west of the Mississippi. The Missouri is the biggest river it crosses. What if there is a flood on the Missouri which cannot be controlled by the flood control dams? Flood waters on the Yellowstone River in eastern Montana may have contributed to this year’s Exxon/Mobile oil pipeline’s rupture which spilled 42,000 gallons of oil into the Yellowstone River. And the Missouri was too much for the dams to control this year. The flooding hit North Dakota in June 2011 and the Missouri River is not expected to be back in its banks on the west side of Iowa until October. If the unlikely environmental damage the tar sands pipeline could do pollutes the water supply for people from Nebraska to the Texas panhandle or sends an oil slick from North Dakota to St. Louis and eventually to the Gulf, is that too big an unlikely risk?

Jobs, Damn It, Jobs

Unemployment is above 9% and much higher when you include those the Government has cast aside. Responses from Sen. Cornyn and Rep. Sam Johnson fail to mention jobs or unemployment. Rep. Pete Sessions believes “Congress must focus on policies that will create jobs.” But, he wants to create jobs by eliminating funding for the EPA and eliminating regulations protecting the air his two sons breathe and the water they drink. (HR 2584 and other bills scheduled for further discussion in the House in Sept.)

Republicans are not the only ones blocking out reality. House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi says, “we will continue fighting to create American jobs,” but provides no hint of a path forward to create those jobs. Continue implies there is an ongoing effort - an effort hidden from public view. The White House response to my comments on job creation consisted of one short paragraph about the 2009 Stimulus plan: Wall Street reform, credit card abuse, assisting homeowners, helping struggling families, and a pathetic statement regarding the time recovery will take. We will, however, prosper in the 21st century. This statement does not comfort the unemployed. Jobs would assist homeowners and struggling families more than any government assistance or welfare program.

The Recovery Act of 2009 created 555,408 jobs nationwide – 45,459 in Texas. <http://www.recovery.gov> Only \$172 billion of the \$275 billion allocated for federal contracts, loans, and grants has actually been paid. The stimulus helped small businesses survive, provided temporary part-time or full-time jobs (some permanent), and delayed a few foreclosures. The Recovery Act supplied additional money to circulate through the economy and provided an avenue for businesses to communicate with the government.

Another stimulus plan similar to the Recovery Act would be a hard sell in Congress. The President and the House and Senate Democrats must sell it hard to the public. A second stimulus could create jobs immediately by focusing on putting teachers, police, and firefighters back to work. Raise the money by taking the subsidies from the oil companies and abolishing the Bush tax cuts. Nix the “payroll tax cut” that puts \$20 a week in the household account. It is more important to get people back to work. The increase in revenue from income tax, social security tax, sales tax, property tax, and reduction in unemployment insurance payments welfare cost will benefit government at all levels.

Infrastructure jobs are another path to providing employment for construction workers until the housing industry rebounds. Many schools, highways, streets, and bridges are in need of repair. Some infrastructure jobs can be available quickly like painting the walls of a school or replacing windows with more efficient windows. Long term employment is secured through new construction.

Private Sector Jobs: Jobs must be created in the private sector. Private Sector jobs can come from expanding businesses, new businesses, or bringing back manufacturing jobs from overseas. Manufacturing jobs depend on demand for a product sold for a profit. The rate of jobs returning from overseas is too slow to let nature take its course. Corporations like General Electric, known to pay little or no Federal income tax, pay a significant amount of taxes to the federal, state and local governments (ie: State Income Tax, Social Security, Unemployment Insurance, Property, sales, and excise taxes, and a variety of other taxes.) It is not unreasonable to continue tax breaks for businesses *IF* they return manufacturing to the US and *IF* they create jobs for Americans.

Government or people or corporations can't solve this problem individually. Together we can move forward. The American economy is 70% consumer based. Corporations without customers (consumers) are bankrupt. When people are back to work, they are consumers, buying goods and paying taxes. Increased consumer demand provides jobs for more people. Money circulates through our economy and everyone benefits.


